What is the Bachelor of Science in Indigenous Environmental Science?

The Bachelor of Science in Indigenous Environmental Science degree offers you an education focused on the natural environment, but infused with holistic Indigenous perspectives and cultures.

The Bachelor of Science in Indigenous Environmental Science degree is a joint program offered through the First Nations University of Canada and the University of Regina's Faculty of Science. The degree is built around a solid core of science and Indigenous knowledge and is complemented by courses focusing on environmental and ecological topics with an Indigenous worldview. You will also acquire important knowledge in environmental economics and community development. For example, you will learn to not only characterize medicinal plants, but also to preserve and protect them.



Register in our new Introduction to Indigenous Environmental Science (ENVS 100) offered this fall! This course is offered online with some face-to-face discussions.

What courses will I take?

You will not only take foundational Science courses in Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics, and Physics, but also courses in Environmental Studies, Indigenous Studies, Economics and Law. The degree can be completed in four years and offers flexibility through some online courses.
