Adding to the festivities, the powwow featured a couple of unique specials. The "Streetwear Special" allowed participants to dance without the traditional powwow regalia, giving them a chance to "dance their style" in their own way. Additionally, the "Dinosaur Special" brought smiles and laughter as four participants donned inflatable dinosaur costumes to compete, adding a fun and lighthearted twist to the day's events.
